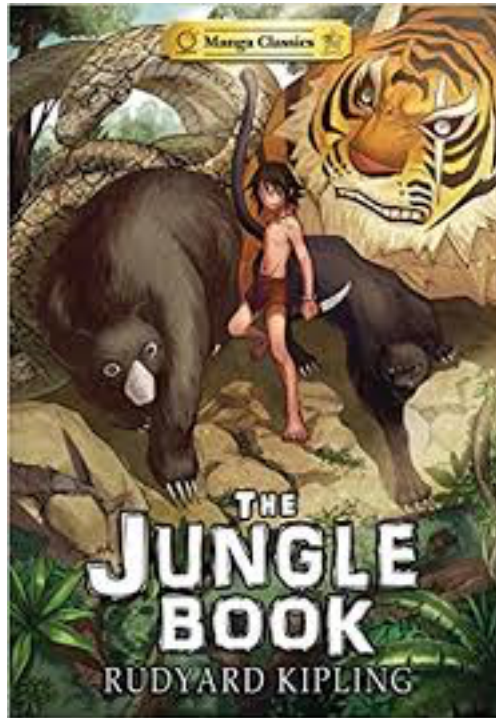

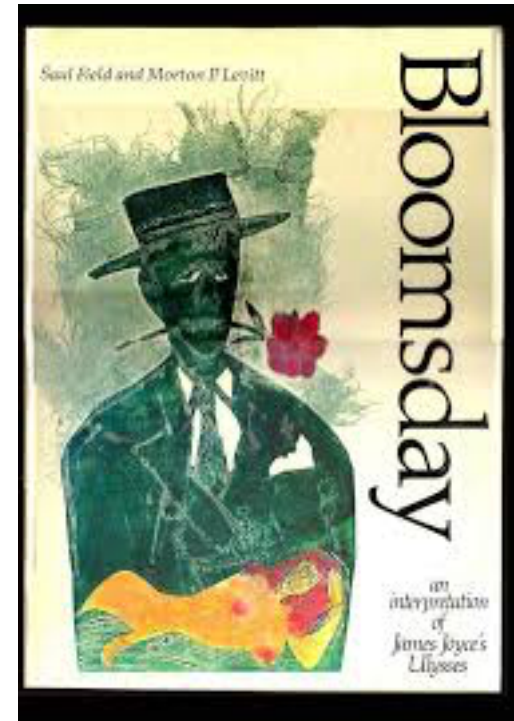

James Joyce (1882 – 1941), Author of Ulysses

What is Bloomsday?
Named after the main character in *Ulysses*, Leopold Bloom, *Bloomsday* celebrates the day on which the novel is set – 16 June.avid Joyceans dress up in style during the Festival (11-16 June).



1. Joyce Tower and Museum, Sandycove
Joyce spent six nights in this Martello Tower in 1904. It also features in the first episode of *Ulysses*.

21 Duke Street
The address of Davy Byrne's pub. In *Ulysses*, Leopold Bloom stopped here for a gorgonzola sandwich and a glass of burgundy. And on Bloomsday you can too.

265,000 
Approximate number of words in *Ulysses*.

3. Sweny's Chemist, Lincoln Place
Sweny's is no longer a chemist, but is an important location in *Ulysses*. These days it is a gathering place for Joycean enthusiasts with an interesting collection of second-hand books.

2. The Bailey Duke Street
The first ever Bloomsday was celebrated here on 16 June 1954.

4. National Library, Kildare Street
Joyce spent many hours reading and studying in the National Library. The library is the scene of the Scylla and Charybdis episode of *Ulysses*.

5. James Joyce House, Usher's Quay
James Joyce's aunts lived here, and it is the setting for one of the world's most famous short stories, *The Dead*.

6. Belvedere College, Great Denmark Street
Joyce became a pupil of Belvedere College on 6 April 1893.

7. Sandymount Strand
This beautiful seaside strand on the south side of Dublin played an important part in two episodes of *Ulysses*.

The year Ireland's first cinema, the Volta Electric Theatre, was opened. It was managed by Joyce.

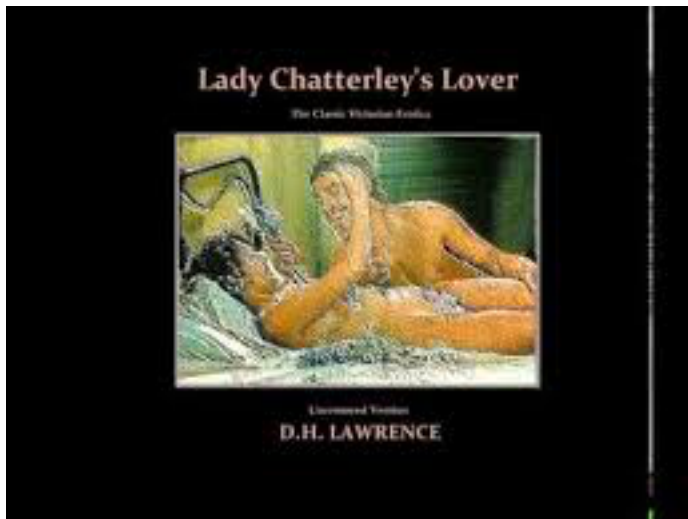

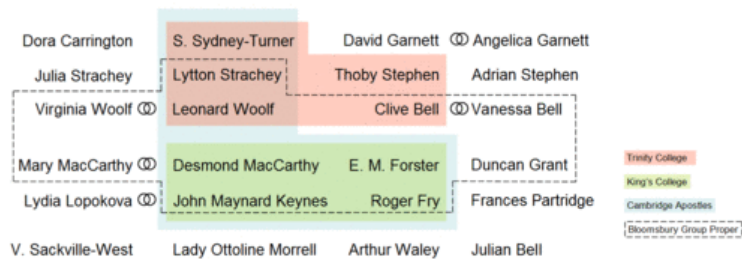
